

In the past year, Immigration Equality answered a record number of calls for help from LGBT and HIV-positive immigrants. Every day, we answer urgent questions from individuals, families, and attorneys. For LGBT and HIV-positive asylum-seekers, we developed a compassionate vetting process to match cases with pro bono law firms mentored and supervised by Immigration Equality. Some of the toughest cases remain in-house with our experienced legal team. The result is a staggering record of victories; over the past three years, we have won 98% of our cases.

In the words of a gay asylum-winner from Jamaica: "My case was handed over to the most competent attorneys at Ropes & Gray, and I am pleased my asylum approval was granted for both my son and myself. My heartfelt gratitude to Immigration Equality. I really appreciate their help and the opportunity to live my life free from fear or persecution. our legislative family is building unprecedented momentum for UAFA

Over the summer, Immigration Equality achieved two critical steps for the Uniting American Families Act (UAFA). On June 3, 2009 the Senate held the first-ever Congressional hearing on UAFA. This hearing was a significant step forward in our work to secure full equality for LGBT binational couples. Members of Congress are traditionally reluctant to pass a bill that has not been discussed at a formal hearing.

Just as important, the Uniting American Families Act was included in a larger immigration bill: the Reuniting Families Act in the House of Representatives. Not only is this the first time that LGBT families have been included in a larger immigration package, it is the first time our families have been affirmed in any federal legislation.

our activist family includes board member Ron Buckmire



Ron Buckmire has been an LGBT activist since 1991, when he created the Queer Resources Directory, the first comprehensive directory of LGBT and HIV information on the Internet. He was born in Grenville, Grenada, and earned a Ph.D. in Mathematics from Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute in New York. He chairs the math department of Occidental College and blogs at MadProfessah.com. In 2006, he co-founded the Barbara Jordan/Bayard Rustin Coalition, a Black LGBT advocacy organization in Los Angeles. Before becoming a naturalized U.S. citizen in 2003, he was the foreign half of a binational couple, and he is credited with coining the name "Immigration Equality."

A seasoned political activist, Ron took the time to answer some of the frequently asked questions about Immigration Equality's current strategy:

UAFA, RFA, CIR – this feels like alphabet soup. Can you explain?

Ron: The UAFA defines "permanent partnership" for same-sex couples under immigration law and outlines how permanent partners can meet strict anti-fraud standards to qualify for immigration benefits. The House RFA, or Reuniting Families Act, is a package of family unification measures, most of which would shorten crushing wait times for families who have applied to reunite. The RFA was introduced this summer and includes the

full text of UAFA. CIR, or comprehensive immigration reform, refers to a pending, omnibus bill that will be a major overhaul and modernization of our broken immigration system. It will make needed changes in family unification, provide a path to citizenship for undocumented people, and correct other aspects of our immigration system. The RFA is a model for the family immigration component of that CIR package. The CIR bill itself has not yet been finalized.

Will UAFA be part of CIR?

Ron: CIR legislation is being written now, and Immigration Equality is pushing hard to make sure our families are in it. CIR is moving fast. President Obama has indicated that he supports a vigorous debate — and a vote — on immigration reform early in 2010.

Immigration is such a contentious issue — why get caught up in CIR?

Ron: Two reasons: first, it's the best chance to pass UAFA, because stand-alone immigration legislation outside of CIR is unlikely to succeed. Second, because LGBT families need immigration reform of all kinds. We don't just need recognition of our loving, committed partnerships — we need to grow up in intact, safe homes with our parents and extended family there to provide us support, not separated by decade-long visa lines. We need enough work visas so that people like me who got a PhD. in the U.S. don't take our skills elsewhere. We need a path to citizenship so queer kids brought here as babies aren't treated like criminals. We need to know that if we are detained in immigration jail, we will not be targeted based on our sexual orientation or gender identity.

So is the stand-alone UAFA still a priority for Immigration Equality?

Ron: Absolutely. Immigration Equality continues to champion the Uniting American Families Act in Congress and in the media, too. Every day, we ask lawmakers to support UAFA and to push for it to be included in CIR as well. Our strategy has never been "either/or." Our guiding principle is to end immigration discrimination against LGBT families, regardless of what vehicle provides that opportunity.

What do LGBT people bring to the CIR effort?

Ron: Our community has never before had the opportunity to support comprehensive immigration reform enthusiastically, loudly, and strongly — because our families have never been in it before. Now that we are included in preliminary legislation like RFA, we have the chance to be a major force for passage of CIR. We bring many assets to the progressive coalition for immigration reform, among them grassroots power that is fiercely committed to family unity, a powerful, 82-member LGBT Equality Caucus in Congress, and mediasavvy about how to generate sympathy for families under fire. We are mobilizing individual activists and LGBT groups to support the CIR effort, and together, we will win.


